



TOM BRADLEY
Head Coach, 1979-90

The second winningest coach in JU history, Bradley compiled a career record of 432-291-2, and is second in school history with a .597 winning percentage. Guided the team to three 40-win seasons and led JU to 30 or more wins in each of his final nine years. Inducted in 1996.



ERNIE CARR
1985-88

Carr earned All-America honors as a senior in 1988, when he hit .440 and led the nation with 32 doubles, which were JU single-season records. In four years, Carr set two single-season and seven career records, despite missing half of his junior year with a broken leg. Inducted in 1994.

1969-72

Ezzell ranks among the top 10 in career home runs, RBI and total bases. In three years on the hill, Ezzell was 10-0 with a 2.90 ERA. As a senior, he led the squad with 12 home runs and 46 RBI, while also going 6-0 in nine games to lead the Dolphins to the 1972 District 3 Tournament in Gastonia, N.C. Inducted in 1996.

A three-year letterwinner in baseball and soccer, Jackson helped establish both programs. As a pitcher, Jackson ranks sixth in ERA (2.67) and is fourth in complete games (19) to go along with his tie for second with four shutouts. In soccer, he was equally dominant at the right fullback position. Inducted in 2009.

Katz ranks fifth on the career average list, while becoming the first player to lead JU in hitting in consecutive years (1973-74). He is tied for fourth in RBI, ranks sixth in hits and seventh in home runs and total bases. Katz was an All-America in 1973, when he hit .396 with eight home runs and 67 RBI. Inducted in 1995.

In only two years, Mendes threw 18 complete games and won 20 games for a .769 all-time win percentage. He tossed the second no-hitter in Dolphin history (Atlanta Baptist - 5/1/70) and still holds JU career records in ERA and shutouts (8). He recorded a school-record five shutouts with a 0.72 ERA in 1969. Inducted in 1998.

One of two baseball inductees in the inaugural Hall of Fame in 1993, McMillan was named *The Sporting News* All-America and American Baseball Coaches Association Second Team in 1973. McMillan is ranked in the top-10 of six offensive categories at JU, including a school-record 141 steals. Inducted in 1993.

One of the greatest soccer players in school history, he holds career records in goals (66) and points (154). Inducted in 1995.

Tom McMillan, a junior right-hander, made baseball history at Jacksonville University yesterday afternoon as he pitched a perfect game to beat the University of Florida, 1-0.

In an earlier game Florida was victorious, 2-0.

The crafty McMillan scored several runs for the Jacksonville University baseball team during not only the first perfect game for the Dolphins in their seven-year history, but also the first no-hitter, Coach Bob Daughlin said.

He added it is the first perfect game a pitcher of his has thrown, also. It also was McMillan's first no-hitter.

"He was better only two hitters all day," Daughlin commented. "McMillan pitched the last batter of the game at 3-0, but made him pop up to the catcher after hitting off a

Cost No-Hits Akron As JU Takes a Pair

Tim Cost, a freshman right-hander making his first appearance for Jacksonville University, pitched a no-hitter Friday as the Dolphins shut out the Akron University Zips 12-0 in the first game of a doubleheader Friday at Brest Field.

The Dolphins won the second game 11-6 over Ashland College as catcher Fran Chamberlain completed a perfect day at the plate getting eight hits in as many trips. Chamberlain knocked in three runs in the second game and Rick Shaw had a triple to spark a three-run burst that put the game away in the seventh.

Chamberlain stroked two doubles and two singles and drove in four runs. Shaw drove in four runs with a pair of singles.

"The big lead made it a lot easier," said Cost, who now has 10 no-hitters — seven in high school and two in Little League. "All I had to do was throw the ball in there. I knew I was working on a no-hitter all the time, nobody had to tell me."

JU baseball records are sketchy but according to Lamabe, it is the only no-hitter recorded by a JU pitcher in the last five years.

By his own estimate, Cost is JU's No. 8 pitcher.

"We have a strong staff," he said, "but I hope this moves me up a few spots."

Cost, a 5-foot-10, 167-pound right-hander from Camillus, N.Y., struck out three and used just 89 pitches. A leadoff walk in the fourth inning was the only blemish on Cost's worksheet and he retired the last 18 batters he faced.

"He just had good control," said JU Coach Jack Lamabe. "He stayed ahead of the hitters and that's what did it for him."

JU collected 16 hits and had a four-run outburst in the first inning and scored six more in the fourth.

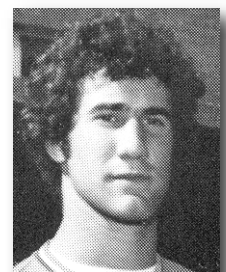

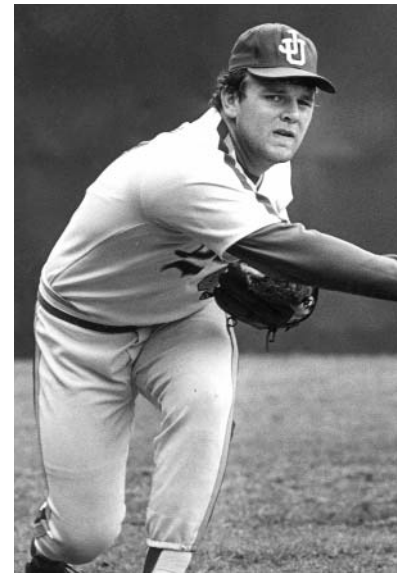

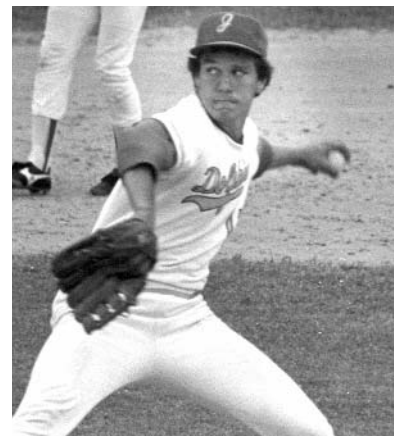
